

Pupil Premium 2017-18



The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, a funding stream first available in the 2012-13 financial year, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) and their wealthier peers. Funding is also available for Looked After Children and children Adopted from Care, together with children of families in the services. This funding, specifically targeted at tackling disadvantage, must reach the pupils who need the additional support it brings the most. Each year the Pupil Premium is allocated to schools and is clearly identifiable in the school's budgeting. It is for schools to decide how this funding is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility.

At Barnes Primary School we have a relatively small number of pupils who are eligible for Pupil Premium. From September 2017 we expect to receive funding for 32 pupils on roll:

The amount of Pupil Premium that Barnes Primary expects to receive during 2017-18 is **£54,400**.

It is really important that parents let the school know if their family is eligible for this benefit (even if they don't take up the option of their child having a free school meal). This is because the school will receive additional funding each year for every child that is eligible. This money goes towards financing additional one-to-one or small group provision; funding additional booster classes; funding free places in our after school clubs; employing a learning mentor and ensuring that we meet the needs of all our pupils who are at a disadvantage when compared to their peers, even if they are not eligible. In this way we ensure that this additional funding has a positive impact on our learners.

Our intention is to enable every single pupil in our school to reach, or surpass, the national performance expectation for their age. For some pupils who have very significant special educational needs that is not always possible. All children at our school have consistently performed extremely well, including those pupils who have an entitlement to Pupil Premium funding. It sometimes takes a little longer for some of our Pupil Premium pupils to reach the national standard, but by the time they leave us the vast majority have done so.



Latest outcomes for pupils eligible for PP 2017-18 (end of year assessment 2016-17)

A guide to the meaning of the assessment descriptors that have been used:

Greater Depth – this refers to a performance that is in advance of the nationally expected standard for the child’s year group. Pupils performing at greater depth are doing very well indeed.

Secure – this refers to pupils whose performance meets the national expectation for their year group. These pupils are doing well and meeting the ambitious milestones the government has set.

Developing – these pupils are currently not quite meeting the nationally expected standard for their age. They are being closely monitored and supported to enable them to do so in the future, but this may take time.

Emerging – these pupils are finding learning very hard and currently performing well below the nationally expected standard for their age. They will be receiving a very high level of additional support to enable them to make faster progress. The target for them will still be to reach the national performance standard for their age by the time they transfer from our school.

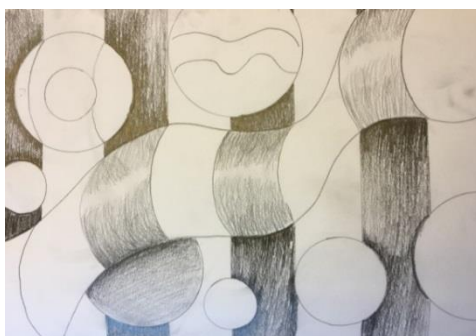


11 pupils in receipt of the Pupil Premium grant left the school in summer during 2016-17, of whom 9 were in Year 6 and therefore took end of Key Stage 2 tests.

End of KS2 outcomes for pupils eligible for the Pupil Premium 2016-17

This was the second year of a new national grading system. The national expectation is that a child should achieve a score of 100 or above, with a maximum possible score of 120. A score under 100 is therefore below expectation, a score of 100 is at expectation and a score of over 100 is above expectation (with results closer to the 120 level considerably above expectation).
